The first of our 3 papers is by **Dr Dominique Goullet** entitled 'To sterilise flexible endoscopes' where Dominique discusses the need for more critical

scopes to be sterilised by low temperature methods; gastroscopes where biopsies are taken, hysteroscopes, cystoscopes. Where should this process sit? Within our already stretched sterile service department or within our endoscopy departments? Certainly gives us food for thought!

Our second paper is in two parts. 'Disinfection of surfaces and medical devices' by C. Diekmann, S. Krüger, I. Mock, L. Rohrbach, V. Schmidt, R. Thomann, M. Schreiner, and Dr. J. Lenz. This paper first appeared in Zentral Sterilisation. Part 1 examines at surface disinfection and Part 2 examines medical devices; this article is intended to be a practical guide to selecting chemicals for surfaces, worktops and medical devices.

The final paper for this journal, 'Requirements for systems designed to store/store and dry thermolabile endoscopes' was written by a CSC Working Group comprising of John Prendergast, Tina Bradley, Karren Staniforth, Paul Jenkins, Olga Sleigh, Andy Lawton, and Maria Ruiz-Luque. This article looks at both storage and storage/drying cabinets and offers advice on what to look for when procuring a cabinet, operation managements of the cabinets, validation and periodic testing along with providing information on portable storage systems used for flexible endoscopes. A 'must-read' for all endoscopy managers and staff.

We have featured two 'From the Archives' articles. The first by **D.J. Anderson**, Deputy Manager
C.S.S.D./T.S.U. telling us about The Foundation Course for Sterile Services Managers; was the precursor to our IDSc Technical Certificate?

The second was a paper given by **Paul Houslop** at the 1977 ASSA Conference, again looking at The

Training of C.S.S.D. Managers. The aim of the training was to provide the C.S.S.D. manager with a tangible and meaningful figure of authority and provide confidence that a good standard was being achieved as well as being a source of credible advice, in the field of decontamination, for other disciplines.

Phil Hadridge is back again in our 'Something Different' section and this time Phil looks at the four breakpoints before reaching burnout! Phil's 4 step model illustrates that burnout can be the 'natural' result from a stress response to pressure. Once burnout is reached the key actions are acknowledgment, seeking help, stepping back from the patterns that helped create the situation and, most importantly, being kind to yourself and others!
